BALONNE SHIRE PROFILE

The Balonne Shire covers an area of 31,152km2 and has a resident population of 4,345 people (ABS 2023).


The local government area comprises seven communities, St George, Thallon, Dirranbandi, Bollon, Nindigully, Mungindi and Hebel. St George is the hub of the shire and is centrally located at the intersection of six highways, ensuring strong transport links and a constant flow of goods and visitors into the region. St George also has an airport which is serviced with regular Rex Airlines flights.

Traditionally, the shire's economy has been built around the agriculture sector, led by cotton, grain, sheep and cattle production. The shire is currently experiencing exciting growth in the tourism industry, welcoming more than 16,000 visitors per year (BSC Visitor Information Centre 2023).

WHY DO WE NEED AN ARTS AND CULTURE STRATEGY?

The Balonne Shire has an abundance of talented local artists, musicians and creatives. This strategy is both a framework and vision that will guide council's efforts to support and strengthen Balonne's arts and culture sector over the next five years.

The benefits of a strong and sustainable arts and culture sector

Arts, cultural and creative activities are known to have positive, direct and indirect effects on the economy, employment, tourism and society more broadly.¹

It has been proven that local arts and culture sectors, typically composed of micro businesses and some small to medium enterprises, have the potential to develop into powerful economic clusters, helping to drive significant economic growth within their communities.²

Research demonstrates that strong and sustainable arts and culture sectors build thriving communities and can be a key factor in attracting new residents to communities.³

It is also well documented that arts and cultural programs and activities for young people can improve selfesteem, positive behaviour and academic outcomes.⁴

The positive social impacts of a thriving arts and culture sector should not be overlooked or undervalued. We reached over 700 local voices through our community consultation process. They told us that engagement in arts and cultural experiences fosters social connection, improves health and wellbeing and is an important source of fun and joy.

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CONSULTATION OVERVIEW

This 5-year Arts and Culture Strategy has been informed by over 700 voices through an in-depth engagement and consultation process. As part of this process, we heard from community members, local artists, musicians and creatives, arts and cultural organisations and groups, as well as key strategic partners outside the shire.

Community survey

The response from the community survey was overwhelmingly positive with 98.5% of respondents ranking arts and cultural programs, activities, events, venues and development as especially important.

Key themes identified in the community survey included:

- An ardent desire to have a dedicated gallery space within the shire.
- Desire to celebrate and embrace First Nations and multicultural arts and culture.
- Children and young people in our shire need more exposure to arts and culture.
- Upgrades required for venues and arts/cultural spaces to make them inviting and comfortable spaces. Specific items mentioned included:
 - o accessibility
 - o acoustics, sound equipment, lighting and stages
 - heating and cooling

- Empower and support developing arts / culture organisations and artists / musicians.
- Include all towns across the shire
- Local arts groups and organisations should work together to share events, resources and venues, when possible.

Youth consultation





Children feedback summary

St George State High School





Key themes identified in early years and primary feedback included:

- Art, music and dance were key interests expressed in worksheets completed by children across all towns.
- A desire to learn more about First Nations culture and art was a common theme, particularly traditional dot painting and dance.
- Wood, steel and art technology (animation, film and Artificial Intelligence) were also listed as areas of interest by several respondents.

Young people feedback summary

We specifically sought feedback from young people attending high school within the Balonne Shire. High school students surveyed said arts and cultural experiences provided the following benefits:

- helps them feel like engaged and active community members
- gives them a sense of freedom and self-expression
- provides a healthy and productive outlet
- gives them a way to connect with other young people
- allows them to express themselves
- allows them to connect with their culture
- assists them to connect with different ideas and perspectives.

This group of young people were most interested in events and festivals, closely followed by music and concerts. Interest was also expressed in crafts, theatre and plays, as well as galleries and museums.

The senior art students at the St George State High School expressed an interest in being able to participate in arts and cultural competitions for young people. They also expressed a powerful desire to participate in community art projects, including murals and other public art.

Arts and culture stakeholder consultation

We identified 26 groups, organisations and individuals within the shire who have either direct or indirect involvement in arts and cultural activities, events and programs. Each of these organisations was contacted and invited to contribute their thoughts and feedback to inform the development of council's Arts and Culture strategy.

A total of 9 organisations and individuals agreed to participate in interviews as part of our engagement and consultation process. The Regional Arts Services Network Provider for our region also provided feedback and direction.

Key themes identified in stakeholder feedback included:

- The shire lacks a gallery space both for local artists and creators to exhibit and sell their work, and for travelling art and craft exhibitions.
- Several recommendations relating to RADF were consistently raised, including:
 - establishing a wider variety of RADF categories and grant sizes (for example, young creatives, First Nations, big event and quick response grants)
 - providing previous RADF fund recipient information to the community (for example, successful recipients and projects listed on the council website)
 - improving communication with RADF applicants and arts and culture community groups, particularly for funding rounds, processes and key dates.
- Council should explore opportunities to support the development of emerging and established creatives based in the shire.
- Council should explore opportunities to support the reinvigoration and build capacity of arts and culture community groups.
- Too many free events devalue arts and cultural activities and programs, making it difficult for local artists and creatives to remain viable and sustainable.

OBJECTIVES AND STRATEGIES

Overview

The Arts and Culture Strategy will guide Balonne Shire Council's activities to embrace, celebrate, support, develop and promote Balonne's arts and culture sector.

A thriving arts and culture scene, which intrinsically links all towns within our shire, will further enrich our communities and provide an opportunity for our arts and culture sector to enjoy sustainable development and growth.

Objectives

- 1. Create an environment that supports and encourages the growth of a thriving arts and culture sector.
- 2. Increase the number of practicing artists, musicians and creatives across age groups and cultures.

3. Boost arts and culture tourism by linking and promoting arts and culture businesses and activities across all towns within the shire.

Strategies

- 1. Support local artists, musicians and creatives to develop a strong and sustainable sector.
- 2. Renew and maintain infrastructure to support the development of our arts and culture sector.
- 3. Increase opportunities for children and young people to experience and engage in arts and cultural activities, events and programs.
- 4. Celebrate, respect and support First Nations and multicultural artists and creators within our community.

ARTS AND CULTURE STRATEGIES

Strategy 1: Support local artists, musicians and creatives to develop a strong and sustainable sector

Overview

We will support the development of our emerging and established local artists, arts organisations and creative businesses to grow their skill base and increase their capacity to:

- seek opportunities
- diversify
- develop their creative skills
- promote their practices and products
- adopt best practice governance and sustainable business models.

What we know

During consultation interviews, local artists, arts organisations and creative businesses repeatedly told us that they would like to access opportunities to develop their creative practices and increase their avenues to promote and sell their work.

Broader community consultation reiterated the sector's view that more needs to be done to reinvigorate and support arts and culture community groups, particularly in attracting and retaining new members and from a governance perspective.

During our consultation process we received many recommendations relating to RADF funding, including:

- establishing a wider variety of RADF categories and grant sizes
- providing greater transparency around previous RADF fund recipients
- improving communication with RADF applicants and arts and culture community groups, particularly for funding rounds, processes and key dates.

What we already do

Regional Arts Development Fund

The Queensland Government, through Arts Queensland, and Balonne Shire Council work in partnership to provide RADF funding opportunities to provide support to artists and community organisations to run projects which promote and develop the arts, culture and heritage in our region.

Community grants

Council supports not-for-profit organisations and community groups through its Community Grants and Assistance Program.

The Community Grants and Assistance Program is a broad-criteria fund. Funds provided through this program can go towards community celebrations, workshops, events, traffic management costs and other activities, which are deemed to be of benefit to the broader community.

Strategy 2: Renew and maintain infrastructure to support the development of our arts and culture sector

Overview

Investment in our existing cultural buildings and offering new infrastructure, combined with 'pop up' and programmed events has many benefits for our shire, including:

- enhancing the vibrancy of our local communities and improving liveability
- providing more opportunities for our residents to engage in arts, culture and creativity
- allowing our arts and culture sector to showcase their talents and products
- making Balonne more appealing to new residents and visitors
- supporting economic development.

What we know

Consultation with our community and local artists and creators has highlighted that many of our existing venues and spaces are either not fit for purpose or are not inviting and comfortable spaces for audiences. Specific issues mentioned included:

- accessibility
- acoustics, sound equipment, lighting and stages
- heating and cooling.

What we already do

Balonne Shire Council own and have responsibility for maintaining numerous arts and cultural buildings and spaces across the shire, including:

- The Cultural Hub in St George
- Five town libraries
- Five town halls
- Four showgrounds
- Numerous outdoor cultural spaces
- Outdoor art and murals throughout the shire.

Strategy 3: Increase opportunities for children and young people to experience and engage in arts and cultural activities, events and programs

Overview

Throughout our consultation processes, adults, young people and children in our shire all expressed a fervent desire to give young people and children greater access to arts and cultural experiences.

Council will connect with our strategic partners and local arts and culture individuals and organisations to address the limited access young people have to arts and culture in our rural and remote location. Where possible, we will collaborate with our partners to increase opportunities for young people and children to participate in local and touring arts and cultural programs and events.

What we already know

Research clearly demonstrates deep value and many benefits for children and young people who have access to, and participate in, arts and cultural activities and programs. This includes developing critical skills for life, such as problem solving, responsible risk taking, critical thinking, empathy and teamwork.

Evidence shows that youth engagement in arts and cultural activities can improve academic outcomes and reduce anti-social behaviour.

What we already do

Balonne Shire Council have an engaged and active Youth Council. The purpose of the Youth Council is to:

- Strengthen engagement between Balonne Shire Council and young people.
- Build young people's knowledge of council processes to enable them to participate in council's decision-making processes.
- Build council's knowledge of the needs of young people and how these needs may be met.
- Enhance the leadership skills of youth and develop a strong positive image and profile of young people within the Balonne Shire
- Promote and encourage youth involvement in the planning and development of council services and infrastructure (especially if they have a direct impact on young people, such as skate parks and recreational facilities)
- Ensure that the views of young people are canvassed and conveyed to council, including providing advice on, or assistance with, formal consultations being undertaken by council.

Young people must apply to be a member of the Youth Council, application requirements include living within the shire, having an interest in community issues and services and enjoying meeting new people. Youth Council members must be aged between 12 and 25 years of age.

Strategy 4: Celebrate, respect and support First Nations and multicultural artists and creators within our community

Overview

Arts and culture can play a unique role in celebrating and sharing the many cultures, languages and traditions of First Nations peoples and other diverse cultures within Balonne.

First Nations arts and cultural expression provide stories, culture and languages that cannot be found anywhere else in the world. This provides our shire with a unique identity which we should embrace and celebrate.

First Nations artists, creative talent and performers are increasingly recognised nationally and internationally, they also attract audiences from all over the world.

With increasing numbers of visitors travelling to and through our shire, there is an opportunity for First Nations and multicultural artists and creatives in our communities to share their art, stories and culture with broader audiences.

Our shire is embracing our growing multicultural community. We have a unique opportunity to celebrate the diverse cultures of our shire through arts and culture.

What we already know

Results from our community survey show that our community believe it is particularly important to support and celebrate First Nations heritage, culture, stories and knowledge in Balonne. Our community also believes it is especially important to support and celebrate multiculturalism in Balonne.

Our youth consultation revealed that young people and children in our shire have a strong desire to learn more about First Nations culture and art, particularly traditional dot painting and dance.

We have several talented First Nations and culturally diverse artists and creatives living and creating in our shire. Some already have established and thriving businesses, others could be supported to further develop their skills and flourish in our shire.

What we already do

Balonne Shire Council consults with a range of First Nations groups including:

- The Balonne Shire Council Indigenous Advisory Committee, with representatives from all six First Nations Peoples corporations
- The Queensland Government sponsored St George First Nations decision making body
- Goondir Health Elders Group.

This action plan will be reviewed annually to ensure our priorities and areas of focus remain aligned with our communities' needs and desires.
